### What does the fund invest in?

The portfolio invests primarily in a diversified mix of equity and income mutual funds with a bias towards capital appreciation. Under normal market conditions, the portfolio has an optimal asset mix of 30-55% debt instruments and 45-70% equity securities.


The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund’s investments on March 31, 2025. The fund’s investments will change.

### How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.


One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund’s returns change over time. This is called “volatility”.

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

#### Risk rating

Franklin Templeton has rated the volatility of this fund as **low to medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund’s returns have changed from year to year. It doesn’t tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.


Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn’t have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

### How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series I units of the fund have performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the series’ returns.

### Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series I units of the fund have performed in each of the past 10 years. The series dropped in value in 2 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the series has been in the past. It does not tell you how the series will perform in the future.



### Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series I units of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

### Average return

The annual compounded return of Series I units of the fund was 4.46% over the past 10 years. If you had invested \$1,000 in this series of the fund 10 years ago, your investment would be now worth \$1,548.

### Who is this fund for?

#### Investors who:

- seek a core balanced fund that is diversified by asset class, region, market capitalization and investment style
- invest for the medium or long term

This series also seeks regular monthly cash flows from investment held outside a registered plan.

### A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan, or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

### How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series I units of the fund. The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other series, funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

#### 1. SALES CHARGES

Series I units are only available under the initial sales charge option.

#### 2. FUND EXPENSES

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As of December 31, 2024, the expenses of Series I were 1.63% of the value of this series. This equals \$16.30 for every \$1,000 invested.

<b>Management expense ratio (MER)</b> This is the total of the management fee (including trailing commission), fixed administration fee and any operating expenses not covered by the fixed administration fee.	1.60%

### More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and/or advice that your representative and/or their firm provided to you.

Franklin Templeton pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment.

### 3. OTHER FEES

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Switch fee	Up to 2% of the value of the switched units. You negotiate this amount with, and pay it to, your representative's firm. Your representative's firm may charge you a switch fee for the following: switches from units bought under the initial sales charge option to units without a sales charge or units bought under the initial sales charge option.

#### What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund units within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you will also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by securities law in your province or territory.
